Tourists warned to check health

BRITISH tourists travelling to Europe are being urged to check whether they are still covered for basic medical care should they fall ill or have an accident The European Health Insurance Card (EHIC) replaced the E111 form

three years ago and 28 million Britons have one. But now the Department of Health is warning that three million of the cards expire in the next six months. Recent research by the department found more than half of British people

did not realise that the cards have a shelf life, putting travellers in danger of being unable to access reduced cost or free state healthcare while abroad. The EHIC can be used in EU countries* plus Switzerland, Iceland and

Liechtenstein. Paul Siddell, overseas healthcare programme manager at the Department of Health said: "Many Brits are putting themselves at unnecessary risk by not checking their EHIC expiry date. If you're travelling in Europe it's
